## St Aidan's Comprehensive - Safe Routes to School Update (December 2022)

#### What is Safe Routes to School?

The Safe Routes to School (SRTS) programme launched in March 2021 and was open to all schools in Ireland to apply for active travel funding and delivery. It is designed to facilitate students to walk and cycle to school by:

- Providing "front of school" treatments which will enhance access to school grounds
- Accelerating the delivery of walking, scooting and cycling infrastructure on key access routes to schools
- Expanding the amount of bike parking available at schools

We applied to the programme and are one of the schools that were selected to be in Round 1.

#### What is the plan for our school?

Cavan County Council are aiming to provide improved walking and cycling routes along R190 and R191 in our local area so please support these plans. These will include new pedestrian crossings at key points along these routes and junction improvements. Encouraging the use of all park and stride locations throughout Cootehill and along Station Road R190 will help to reduce traffic around the school by parking away from it and allowing students to walk the shorter distance to / from school. Also creates a healthier environment for all.

Creating a student-centred entrance with direct access to the recently installed Cycle Parking on the school grounds so students and staff can safely enter / exit the school away from vehicles. School Bus Parking within the school grounds only to accommodate all buses with no engine idling.

Cavan County Council is proposing to develop a School Zone at the front of school on the Bailieborough Road R191, as part of the SRTS programme. By reducing traffic congestion at the front of school and providing more space for walking and cycling, the School Zone will make it safer for children and their families to get to school.

#### **Results of Parents Survey**


In March 2022, the school sent out the STRS parent survey to families to get feedback on road safety around the school.


The survey had a 20% response rate.

81.5% of parents surveyed agreed that road safety is a problem around the school

98.7% of parents would support works at the front of school that improve student safety, putting pedestrians and cyclists first.

46.2% of parents surveyed want fewer cars at the school gate.





96.9% of parents surveyed would support works that improve the walking and cycling routes to our school 11.8% of students surveyed live within a 15-minute walk of the school

## **Camoige News**



#### **Looking After Yourself at Christmas**

- 1. Take care of yourself. Eat right, get enough sleep and exercise. Control your alcohol consumption and limit your indulgence in high fat or sugary foods which leads to low mood and anxiety.
- 2. Recognise signs of stress and use relaxation techniques when you begin to get irritated or upset; such taking a few deep breaths, going for a walk or taking a break.
- 3. Have realistic expectations of family and friends. Just because it is Christmas, does not mean the attitudes or behaviours of relatives and friends will change. Accept this and plan how you will respond to help keep the Christmas spirit.
- 4. Make time for yourself. This time does not need to cost anything and can include going for a walk or reading a book. Schedule time for yourself during the busy Christmas period.
- 5. Study or not to study??? We all need a break so plan now the days you are taking off: the usual Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, St Stephen's Day the day after (as you will probably be going out) New Year's Eve and New Year's Day. Study then on the days you have not booked off, but work at your best time. If you need to sleep till 12 then do and study after that. But do a few hours every day. This will help to reduce stress and anxiety when you have a plan. Dedicate a subject /topic you wish to do on that day. You'll feel great once you have it done.
- 6. If you experience persistent low mood or anxiety, consider professional help. There is a wealth of experience and expertise available to deal with mental health difficulties.




