Wellbeing Workshops

1st Year Wellbeing Workshop Eva Farrell, Rang Oonagh

After that we were told a strong story about including everyone. We played a game like Secret Santa. Everybody went to the bottom of the hall, selected a name and wrote a nice message on it.

We all got hot chocolate and a chocolate bar. We danced and participated in some games. We also watched a video about two men who had a lion but had to give it away. However, after a very long time the lion still recognised the two men.

At the end of the workshop, we were taught how to make friendship bracelets and our day finished with dancing.

5th Year Wellbeing Workshop Gerry Morris

On the 12th of October 2023 we 5th years had our first Wellbeing Workshop of the year. Once registration was finished, we all headed to the hall where we were greeted by Fr Joe and his assistant Rose. Fr Joe started off by having a seating plan where the boys and girls would be sitting beside each other, which was a good idea as it got us all talking to people that we would rarely speak to. He started off by doing a few minutes of meditation. He did this quite a lot throughout the workshop as it helped to clear our minds. After meditating Fr Joe got us all to make a card and to write positive comments into it. None of us knew who we were writing the card for. He then gave us all pieces of thread and he got us to make a bracelet to put into the card. When that was done it was breaktime and for break Rose made us all a cup of hot chocolate.

Between the breaks Fr Joe took us all outside to do activities where we all got to learn something new about each other. When we had done that, he took us back into the hall before lunch where we got to do Just Dance.

After lunch Fr Joe gave us all a mask where on one side of the mask we had to put words around the face of the mask that other people would associate us with, and then on the other side he got us to create a mask with colours and designs on it. Once we completed the masks, he took us outside to play a game and when we had finished the game, he ended the day with Just Dance again in the hall. It was an enjoyable day as I got to learn not just more about myself but about other people too.

2nd Year Wellbeing Workshop Dearbhail Shanley

On the 10th of October all second years were welcomed into the hall to take part in a wellbeing workshop. Full of laughter and excitement to spend the whole day with friends, we entered the hall. We sat in our seats and did a couple exercises to warm up. This included jumping jacks and jogging on the spot. Then we sat back down and took a moment of silence where we all closed our eyes to reflect on ourselves. This is the quietest my year group has ever been.

After we had all settled down, we heard the story of a girl who was being bullied for a year and a half. The story was extremely emotional, it felt as if I was watching it happen in front of my own eyes. We were then instructed to write our names on a sticky note and place them on a mat at the back of the hall. Once all the names were placed at the back of the hall, we made our way to the big blue mats in small groups and picked up a random sticky note. We wrote cards to the person we were next to and decorated them with drawings and colours. Then we received three pieces of string to make that person a friendship bracelet. We came together to help each other make a bracelet, and the atmosphere was amazing. Everyone was laughing and having fun with friends. What seemed like a pointless activity at the time is a memory that we will cherish for a lifetime.

By the time we had received our cards and bracelets, it was already break time and we were served hot chocolate and chocolate bars. When we returned to the hall, we were given another piece of paper and were told to write numbers from one to twenty on it. We were then told to write down words at each number. Some of these words included curly, farmer, brothers and goldfish. This game was great fun as we had to find people who were related to the word and get them to sign our page. For example, for the word "curly" we had to locate someone with curly hair.

Full of excitement, we all dashed outside. We all crowded in a big circle to get a pen and then rushed around to find the people relating to the words. After a while of fun and running around the place, we all gathered on the grass. We were separated into girls and boys and played a few games such as lining up from tallest to shortest and lining up in order of the month you were born in. My year group is extremely competitive, so we took these games very seriously.

We went back inside and moved our chairs around the hall, so each chair was touching the wall. We all wondered what we would be doing before lunch, so we were all ecstatic to find out we were playing Just Dance. We all darted into the middle of the hall to have fun with all of our friends.

Unfortunately, the bell rang too early, and we were all dismissed for lunch. When the bell rang for a second time, we all rushed back into the hall to find an arts and crafts activity set up. We were instructed to pick up a paper plate and cut out the center. Then we got a piece of sticky clear plastic and stuck it onto our plate. We ripped up small pieces of mâché paper and stuck them onto the plastic to create a stained-glass window effect. After sticking another piece of plastic on top of our artwork, we punched a hole at the top of the plate and tied a piece of string to it so we could hang it up on any window in our house.

After cleaning up all the excess paper and scissors, we made our way to the center of the hall to sit down and watch a few videos on mental health. To finish off the day we had another session of Just Dance, which was fantastic.

Overall, I really enjoyed the day. The fun we had and the memories we made that day are the things I will think about in years to come.



3rd Year Wellbeing Workshop - Ann Brady

On Friday, 15th of September, two speakers from a group called Throwfire came to our school, St. Aidan's and completed a wellbeing workshop with us third years. They spoke with us about the following topics: anti-bullying, communication, resilience, suicide, social media, and mental health. From the beginning of the workshop, I could tell that my fellow classmates were completely engaged.

We did many different interactive activities. One of those was picking a random name, writing that person a letter, and making them a friendship bracelet from three pieces of string. From my point of view, we all really enjoyed it. At breaktime, we were given a delightful hot chocolate and a choice of KitKats or crisps. After break, Fr Joe called out a list of twenty words that we had to write down on a sheet of paper. Then we had to walk around the hall and find someone who related to that word. For example, we wrote the word "brown," so we had to find someone with brown eyes and get them to sign our paper and whoever got ten boys and ten girls to sign their paper won. Later, we did Just Dance. At the beginning, some people were shy and did not join in, but by the second dance, everyone got up and took part. We danced the "Waka Waka," "Timber," and "What makes you beautiful." Judging by the look on everyone's faces, we all had an amazing time and were very entertained. Then we made a DIY heart out of wool and cardboard to remind us that we should all be kind and considerate towards each other. We ended the day with one more dance before we all helped to tidy up the P.E hall.

In conclusion, Throwfire gave us a powerful lesson which was much needed in today's world. They took an interactive approach and taught us that we should treat each other with great respect and kindness. Approximately one in five adolescents (aged 12 to 18) suffer from at least one mental health disorder and one in 10,000 15-19 year old's in Ireland will die by suicide. From Friday's lesson, I learned that you should check up on your friends and family members to make sure they are okay because you never know what someone else is going through. I also learned that I should keep a close eye out and stand up for others at my school in case they are experiencing bullying. From my perspective Throwfire had an extremely influential and positive impact on me and my peers in 3rd year and we all enjoyed the workshop. Remember that blowing out someone else's candle doesn't make yours shine any brighter.

TY Wellbeing Workshop - Abi Crowe

Everyone from TY present on Wednesday the 11th of October attended a wellbeing workshop presented by Fr. Joe McGrath in the school P.E hall.

First, he introduced himself to all of us, telling us all about his life, jobs and about the association <u>throwfire.ie</u>. Everyone enjoyed his humour and were interested in some of his life stories.

He soon began to complete different calming exercises and he made everyone do these whenever he moved on to a new topic throughout the day.

There were many different activities to do including arts and crafts, "Just Dance" videos and many more. All the different activities allowed everyone in the year to interact with each other in diverse ways. We also spent time outside talking and playing a "Get to know me" game which also allowed people to interact with people they would not think to on an average day.

Fr. Joe McGrath and his assistant also had snack stations holding hot chocolate and small chocolate bars that were dispersed to everyone that wanted some.

Everyone there that day really enjoyed the day as I had heard many complimentary reviews and responses from my peers. I know my friends and I certainly had fun getting to know the presenters and more about the people we usually would not have thought to talk to or interact with.

At the end, we all had many different bits and pieces to remember the day by including handmade bracelets, handmade and written cards from peers, booklets on ourselves and our values and small art crafts.

With a welcomed more interactive and unique approach to these topics, the facilitators effectively put into perspective how stories like those could become a reality for any one of us. Great emphasis was placed on resilience, the importance of a positive mind frame and not being afraid to ask for help.

We completed thoughtful and relaxing activities too such as; writing a letter containing a few words of kindness to someone in the year (names were picked at random), making friendship bracelets and making a candle holder out of clay. It has been a super busy start to the year. The first few days were all about settling back into school life and there were induction sessions which hopefully assisted students in getting to know new classmates and bonding in their new groups. We welcomed new students into Transition Year - Beatricz Flores, Daniela Carrillo Herrera, Tabea Klaus, Sofia Ramos Garcia, Elisabeth Runst, Ylan Bomme, Carla Cabrera, Amalia Recio, Laurin Giesecke, Ilya Mysenko and Eva Juraityte are the new additions to the gang! Sofia and Daniela are leaving us at Christmas to return home and we wish them good luck for the future.

By the nature of TY there are experiences and events that do not happen in other years - some of which are mentioned here. Throughout September and October all students had a workshop called "Don't be mean behind your screen" and learned more about online behaviour from Jackie Fox. She really connected powerfully with students on the topic of bullying, online harassment and her journey following her daughter's suicide to the implementation of what is known as "Coco's Law".

There was a huge fundraising effort for the LA519 Big Breakfast, and TY students are to be highly commended for their work on this. There was a TY retreat and a well-being workshop for all groups also. We all headed off to Emerald Park in mid-September and had a super day out (despite the pouring rain!).

Community Guard Vincent Connell spoke with all students in general terms about crime, driving behaviour and other topics. 4 students were successful in their application to the Gardai and were selected for a week of work experience based out of Bailieborough Garda Station. We ended the half term with some messy but fun pumpkin carving – led by our own Mr. Mayne. This was on the Fancy Dress Day where many of the TVs were creatively dressed and made up.

Indeed, TY students often lend a hand in the day-to-day running of the school - from assisting in the canteen at breaks, to completing a day of "desk duty" in the lobby assisting the office staff, to teamaking and serving at parent-teacher meetings, to Open Night tour guides - the list goes on... There has been so much positive feedback from staff about the assistance given in these areas - a big thanks to the students who really demonstrate positive attitude, willingness to help and ability to do a job well. It has been very positive year to date, and I really hope TY students are enjoying the programme so far, and that they continue to enjoy the remainder of their TY experience. 




Sustainability News:

Sustainability is at the core of education at St. Aidan's. Students are, and will continue to be educated about, and involved in Sustainability issues.



The TY Enterprise group are involved in various practical projects around the school and its surrounding area. They are involved in a recycling project within the school to encourage the school community to recycle and dispose of waste correctly. Visual signage is evident throughout the school to facilitate this. An education campaign with "Did you know?" posters are now in classrooms and general areas in the school.



New Year Project: Metre meadow:

This Team will also be responsible for planting Metre Meadows to provide an important breeding ground for invertebrates (such as insects), a key food source for many birds, amphibians etc. Students learn about the ecological importance of such a project by being actively involved.



Take One Week:

The UN Global Goals for Sustainable development 2015-2030 are displayed in classrooms to increase awareness about the importance of these goals in our community and our world. St. Aidan's is involved in the "Take One Programme". Teachers selected one group and taught about one S.D.G. during one class period over one week (20-24th November) as part of this initiative. Manchester United defeated Swansea City 2-1 on the 12th of May 2013, to lift the Premier League trophy for the 13th time. Ten years later, they've not reached the summit since. Sir Alex Ferguson was leaving, and after the most dramatic end to the 2011/12 season, when United lost the title due to a late Sergio Aguero winner for United's city rivals, Manchester City, against Queens Park Rangers, United fought back, sealing the title with 89 points. Sir Alex had managed the club since 1986, and as the end of an era approached, he urged the fanbase to back their new manager. Ten years of turbulence, drama, chaos and revolt, was just about to begin.

Who was the successor then, to one of the greatest managers the world has ever seen? Well, David Moyes, Everton manager, was his replacement. A fellow Scot, just like Sir Alex, he had seen moderate success since taking the reigns at the Merseyside team near the end of the 2001/02 season. In 518 games with the team, he had a 42% win rate. The story goes is that Sir Alex handpicked Moyes to be his replacement. Unfortunately, that trust was sadly misplaced.

The 2013/14 transfer window for the reigning champions of England was turbulent. None of the main players from the 2012/13 squad left. However, there was very little activity when it came to buying players. Marouane Fellaini, one of the most crucial players in the Everton side Moyes coached, joined for a fee of £27,500,000. Perhaps it was a sign of things to come when he was the only high profile signing in a poor summer for the club.

The season started well. A victory in the Community Shield final against Wigan Athletic, with the previous season's star striker Robin van Persie bagging a brace, with the game finishing 2-0. It would be the only taste of silverware United would taste that season. On the opening day of the Premier League season, United travelled to the Liberty Stadium to play Swansea. Another brace from Robin van Persie, along with two goals as well from Danny Welbeck, secured a 4-1 win away from home. It wasn't a convincing win however, and United fans were upbeat, but also slightly concerned, before two very challenging games against Chelsea and Liverpool. United drew 0-0 against Jose Mourinho's Chelsea team at Old Trafford, before losing the North-West Derby 1-0 to Liverpool, after a fourth minute Daniel Sturridge goal.

Two wins on the trot against Crystal Palace and Bayer Leverkusen, the latter game United's first in that season's UEFA Champions League, set the scene for a mouthwatering Manchester Derby at the Etihad Stadium. United left with nothing. Manchester City raced into a 4-0 lead in the first 50 minutes, with Sergio Aguero, Yaya Toure and David Silva all getting on the scoresheet. Wayne Rooney scored a consolation, to become the highest scoring player in the Derby, but the writing was on the wall. The previous December, United won the exact same fixture with a 90th minute Robin van Persie winner, but this time, United were nowhere to be found. United made up for their defeat against Liverpool by winning against them 1-0 in the Capital One Cup, before losing to West Bromwich Albion three days later 2-1.

Finally, United had found form. October was a good month, at least by the standard of the season. Two draws, against Shakhtar Donetsk, and Southampton in the Premier League were offset by wins against Sunderland, Real Sociedad, Stoke and Norwich City. The unbeaten run continued into November, and despite the month being slightly worse than October, fans of the club could smile after after big wins against Fulham, the old enemy Arsenal, and a resounding 5-0 win against Bayer Leverkusen, incidentally their biggest away win in the Champions League. A poor draw against Cardiff City was the low point, and the month ended after a well earned point at White Hart Lane against Tottenham Hotspur.

December began with Moyes facing Everton for the first time at Old Trafford. The game ended with an 86th minute winner from Everton player Bryan Oviedo, before another loss against Newcastle United, sparked fear into the fanbase. Six wins on the trot eased those fears however, ending 2013 on a positive note. In the year where the club had sealed a 20th league title, some fans may have been forgiven for feeling dissatisfied at the start to the 2013/14 season, but there was still hope at Old Trafford.

2014 began with a high profile signing. Juan Mata arrived from Chelsea for £37,000,000, and as things were on the up, United could potentially look forward to a very fruitful year.

The wheels came off in January. Three losses at the beginning of the month saw United knocked out of the FA Cup at the hands of Swansea, and suffering a first leg defeat to Sunderland in the semi final of the Capital One Cup. United did get their revenge against Swansea in the league, but it was yet another false dawn, as they lost to Chelsea 3-1 at Stamford Bridge, a Samuel Eto'o hat trick proving decisive for the Blues. The second leg against Sunderland came around, and United won it 2-1, bringing the game to a penalty shootout. It was to be the end of United's conquest for a first major trophy of the season however, as Sunderland prevailed 2-1 on penalties. The month ended with a 2-0 win against Cardiff, that saw Robin van Persie provide a goal after returning from injury, Juan Mata make his debut, and former United striker Ole Gunnar Solskjaer return to Old Trafford as Cardiff manager. We might hear about him some more in the future.

February was another tough month. United only won a single game, getting the league double over Crystal Palace. They lost 2-1 to Stoke, drew 2-2 and 0-0 with Fulham and Arsenal respectively, before suffering an embarrassing 2-0 loss to Olympiacos in the Champions League Round of 16 first leg. Things had to change, and the first calls for the head of David Moyes were coming from the United faithful. Was March any better? Yes, it was. United won four games, against West Bromwich Albion, West Ham United, Aston Villa, and a remarkable Champions League comeback against Olympiacos, winning 3-0 at home. They did, however, lose the second North-West, and Manchester Derbies of the Premier League season, losing both 3-0 to Liverpool and Manchester City, both at Old Trafford.

April proved to be the end for Moyes. A tough draw against Bayern Munich in the Champions League saw them lose 4-2 on aggregate to the German champions, before Moyes' final win as manager came against Newcastle United, with his side winning 4-0 against their old title rivals. It was quite ironic the Moyes era ended after a 2-0 loss to Everton at Goodison Park, with Leighton Baines and Kevin Mirallas putting the final nails in his coffin.

So who would replace Moyes? Why, nobody except United legend Ryan Giggs. He entered the dugout against Norwich, and after reverting back to a familiar Ferguson 4-4-2, they trashed the Canaries 4-0, with Wayne Rooney and Juan Mata both scoring twice. Was it a false dawn? You could say so. The following week, United lost to Sunderland again, before clinching their final win of the season against Hull City. Matchweek 38 of a dismal season loomed. Manchester City and Liverpool were going toe to toe for the league title, with City ending up as champions again, after a 2-0 win against West Ham on the final day of the season. United's campaign ended with a 1-1 draw against Mauricio Pochettino's Southampton. Their title defence had been abysmal. The Red Devils finished seventh, missing out on European football for the first time since the 1989/90 season. Failure wasn't a word associated with Manchester United, but it was about to become very normal indeed.

The off-season saw Louis van Gaal appointed as permanent manager, but after a season where they went from scoring 89 to 64 points, could he wave his magic wand and fix England's dominant side? Only time would tell.

Coding Competitions 2023/24

There are many different coding initiatives and competitions which are open to all students to enter. Students interested in entering any of the competitions listed should speak with Ms Noone.

1. Bebras First Round 2023 – 13th – 29th November 2023

Coding and Computer Science students from St. Aidan's Comprehensive School participated in "The Bebras Computing Challenge" which introduces computational thinking to students, by allowing them to solve interactive tasks online. It is run in over 50 countries and takes place every November. The tasks can be answered without prior knowledge about computational thinking or information and communication technology.

All students will receive a certificate for taking part. The top performing students are then invited to the National Finals in 2024. In 2021 three students representing St. Aidan's Comprehensive School were invited to the National Finals which were held online.

2. Hour of Code - December 4th - 11th 2023

The Hour of Code takes place each year during Computer Science Education Week December 4th - December 11th. Computer Science Education Week is held annually in recognition of the birthday of computing pioneer Admiral Grace Murray Hopper (December 9, 1906). All students who complete their Hour of Code will receive a certificate.

3. Scratch – Closing date 20th March 2024

The next National Scratch Competition is open for entries and deadline for project submissions is 20th March 2024. All students who take part and enter a project will receive a certificate. Project entries can be from an individual or from a team of not more than 3 students per team. The Scratch National Final will take place in University of Limerick, May 2024 with the date to be confirmed.

4. OECD PILA Project

Ms Noone was invited to participate in the OECD Platform for Innovative Learning Assessments (PILA) as one of three Irish schools currently participating in the International Pilot stage. Students in Singapore, Brazil, Netherlands, Germany and Ireland have been selected for the Pilot Stage September 2021 - April 2022. St. Aidan's Comprehensive School has successfully participated in previous Pilot Programmes for introducing Coding, Computer Science and ePortfolios.

PILA provides 'learning assessments', which are assessment experiences that include resources and structured support (i.e. scaffolds) for learning. During these experiences, students iteratively develop programs using various forms of support, such as tutorials, automated feedback, hints and worked examples. The assessments are cumulative, asking students to use what they practiced in earlier tasks when completing successive, more complex tasks.

Throughout January - March 2022, Coding and Computer Science students from 1st, 2nd, 3rd and TY will participated in PILA. The final report is being launched on 14th December 2023 titled: The Platform for Innovative Learning Assessments: Supporting teachers to use digital tools for developing and assessing 21st century competences.

Dream Space Ambassador Programme

Dream Space Ambassador Programme is a student leadership programme about digital technology and learning how to mentor other students in STEM education. The Dream Space Ambassadors are TY students: Chloe Hannigan, Clara McCaul, Draiocht NiDubhshlaine and Grace Brady.

So far, we have taken part in a training course learning about Microbit, and several live events for occasions such as Maths Week and Climate Action Week. As part of the programme, we have set up and started running a computer club for first year every Tuesday at lunchtime, where we teach students about internet safety, coding and other things that they are interested in learning about.
